



Evidence has been submitted by local residents to show that, at the mouth of the river, the cliffs opposite the reserve have been cut back in places 50 feet in the last six years, and the reserve encroached upon accordingly. The general rate of encroachment has been 4 feet to 5 feet a year; 500 feet of foreshore is affected.


The following statement was submitted by a local land holder, who has observed the progress of the erosion







2008 available controls

Method	Likely efficacy	Feasibility	concerns
1. Directly targeting Asterias	Potentially effective given adequate intensity diving effort. Likely to require ongoing removal	Feasible at shallow depths <12m at small-moderate spatial scales (1,000-10,000m2) eg. Aquaculture leases, localised high density populations in wharf structures.	Minimal environmental concerns.

2014-17: 'Turn Off the Tap' (\$210,000) Sustainability Vic. 'Litter Hotspots'


Australian first trawl study in major rivers for microplastics.

Design & trial of litter audit methods for beaches, schools and streets.



2017-20: Clean Bay Blueprint. (\$289,076) DELWP Port Phillip Bay Fund.

Continued river trawls, beach audits, education, advocacy and protection of the Bay.


2016-17: 'Be the Re-Generation' project funded by Helen Macpherson Smith Trust (\$185,100) engaging young people in citizen science for the Bay.
